Endowed/Donor & Outside Scholarships Frequently Asked Questions

What is a Scholarship?

Scholarships are a type of assistance awarded to students for the purpose of supporting them in pursuing their education. Scholarships do not have to be paid back and students are selected for this type of aid based on a range of criteria which usually reflect the values and purposes of the donor or founder of the award.

What is the Endowed/Donor Scholarship program offered through Providence College?

Providence College Alumnae and Alumni, foundations, corporations and other supporters of the College generously contribute endowed/donor scholarships to Providence College to support the educational opportunity of deserving students. The donations from these benefactors enhance the College's financial aid program. Each scholarship has specific criteria which usually reflect the value and purposes of the donor.

How can I apply for the Endowed/Donor Scholarships at Providence College?

Scholarship recipients for Endowed/Donor Scholarships are selected and distributed by the Office of Financial Aid in accordance with the specific criteria for each scholarship. **No separate application is necessary.** All eligible students who meet the qualifications for a particular fund will be considered for the Endowed/Donor scholarships that are currently available. If you are selected for an Endowed/Donor scholarship, notification of the award will appear on your Financial Aid Notice from the Office of Financial Aid.

Are there any deadlines for applying for Endowed/Donor Scholarships?

You must meet the annual Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) applicable filing deadline. Entering freshman students must have filed the FAFSA no later than February 1 and returning students must have filed their FAFSA no later than April 15th.

How do I apply for Outside Scholarships?

The internet has become the primary resource for searching for scholarships. However, don't waste your time or money on fee-based scholarship matching services. They won't get any better information than you can get from using the free websites or search engines that are available. Most often these websites will require you to create a user name, password and profile in order to search their databases. Some popular search engines are as follows:

Are there any deadlines for applying for Outside Scholarships?

Each scholarship you find will most likely have different deadlines and application requirements. Prime months for scholarship deadlines are January through April for awards starting the following fall semester. Keep in mind many scholarships are only awarded once a year, so missing a deadline can mean missing out until the next cycle. Applications submitted past the deadline are usually not considered.

Are there any tips or things I should know about when searching for Outside Scholarships?

Watch out for Scams! Scholarships that sound too good to be true usually are. Learn how to recognize and protect yourself from the most common scholarship scams - if you have to pay money to get money, it's probably a scam!

Search Early! Gather application materials early and give yourself plenty of time to complete each step. Most often scholarship applications can be as involved as your admissions applications. Some scholarship applications require

essays, recommendations or even resumes.

Make Copies! Never send your only copies of paperwork to anyone. Keep copies of everything and anything you send! It would be heartbreaking to re-write an essay you spent a lot of time and effort on because it was lost in the mail.

Send a thank you note! If you are selected for a scholarship that is funded by a specific group or individual, consider sending a thank you note.

What happens to my current financial aid if I received an Endowed/Donor or Outside Scholarship?

Outside Scholarships (including tuition benefits) are considered need-based and your original aid offer may need to be adjusted if the receipt of the outside scholarship exceeds your calculated federal need or current eligibility. Outside scholarships will always be applied against your unmet need first. If it is necessary to adjust your aid the change or reduction in your award will begin with monies that are least beneficial to you. Your loans will be reduced or reallocated first, followed by work study and then institutional assistance if necessary. Please note outside scholarships do not replace the family contribution. You will receive a revised Financial Aid Notice from the Office of Financial Aid confirming these changes.

Endowed/Donor Scholarships are also considered need-based and your original aid will be adjusted somewhat similarly to outside scholarships. Please note, if you are selected as a recipient for an Endowed/Donor scholarship, the funds will be used to replace, not supplement, dollar for dollar your current institutional grant. If you do not have any institutional grants, then the endowed scholarship will be applied towards your unmet need first followed by a reduction or reallocation of your student loan followed by work study if necessary. You will receive a revised Financial Aid Notice from the Office of Financial Aid confirming these changes.

I was awarded an Outside Scholarship, but it doesn't appear on my Financial Aid Notice! Why not?

Your outside scholarships may not appear on your Financial Aid Notice if we have yet to be notified. Most often you will receive notification of outside scholarships before we will. Therefore, if you expect to receive an outside scholarship you **must** notify the Office of Financial Aid in writing or by using the Award Letter Response Form found under the Forms section of our website. The letter must include the total amount of the scholarship as well as how the money is going to be distributed to Providence College (i.e. all in one semester or split over both semesters). Please keep in mind that Providence College does not have any control on the timeliness of payments from outside agencies and students and parents are responsible for any balance on their bill if the proceeds from an outside scholarship do not arrive before late fees are assessed each semester.

If I receive an outside scholarship check at my home address, what should I do with it?

If the group or agency giving you the scholarship sends the check directly to you, you must bring or mail it to the Student Accounts Office located in Room 400 in Harkins Hall. Most often checks are made out to the student and Providence College and therefore you are required to endorse the check before it can be applied as payment to your account.

Is my Endowed/Donor or Outside Scholarship taxable?

Under current Internal Revenue Service (IRS) regulations, a portion of a large scholarship or grant may be considered taxable income, which must be reported by the student to the IRS on the appropriate tax form. IRS regulations consider any amount or combination of scholarship and grant and NCAA Special Assistance Fund that is greater than the annual amount of tuition, fees and the cost of books and supplies to be taxable income.

This federal tax obligation applies to all students, including international students attending Providence College. Providence College is required to withhold taxes on the portion of any scholarship which is defined as income by the IRS for all international students. For all international students attending the college who are affected by these provisions, it will be necessary to file an IRS Form 1040NR or 1040NR-EZ by April 15 each year.
