A Message from the Executive Director of Safety and Security

The principal objectives of the Providence College Office of Safety and Security are to safeguard members of the College community, and to protect private and institutional property on campus. To accomplish these tasks, it is essential that violators of College rules be identified and detained. In many instances, this requires a close and constant liaison among the Providence College Office of Safety and Security, College officials, and all other law enforcement agencies.

As a service organization, the Office of Safety and Security attempts to ensure the efficient and peaceful functioning of College community life by stressing the importance of crime prevention, including each member's obligations to take necessary precautions regarding personal safety and to safeguard personal and College property, and to take diligent steps to comply with fire safety regulations. Providence College will take any and all reasonable steps to create and maintain a secure environment for all those working, studying, and living on campus. To accomplish this goal, the Office of Safety and Security relies on the efforts and cooperation of all members of the College community.

While the Office of Safety and Security has no jurisdiction outside of the Providence College campus, it is always ready and willing to provide assistance and information to students living in off-campus housing. On some occasions, this service may include contacting the police, rescue unit, medical personnel, or the parents of an injured or aggrieved student.

This Annual Security Report provides members of the community with information regarding campus security policies, procedures for both reporting crimes and other emergencies occurring on campus and notifying the community of particular crimes, and campus crime statistics.

Providence College complies with all federal, state, and local laws and ordinances, including those regulating the possession, use, and sale of alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, and firearms. Regulations affecting students are contained within the Student Handbook. Regulations affecting employees are contained in the Staff Handbook and in notifications from the Department of Human Resources.

THE OFFICE OF SAFETY AND SECURITY – REPORTING A CRIME OR OTHER EMERGENCY

Emergencies should be reported to the Office of Safety and Security at 2222 from a campus phone or 865-2222 from an outside phone.

Non-emergencies should be reported to the Office of Safety and Security at 2391 from a campus phone or 865-2391 from an outside phone.

The Providence College Office of Safety and Security is located on the main campus at the Huxley Avenue gate. The office provides service to the campus community 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

The office is staffed by an executive director, five shift supervisors, a secretary, 28 officers, five dispatchers/switchboard operators, and approximately 20 students who form a safety escort service.

Under the auspices of the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs Administration, the Office of Safety and Security works closely with the Providence College Safety and Emergency Response Committee, as well as with the Providence Police Department, to create a safe and secure campus environment. In an effort to accomplish this goal, the office provides motor, bike, and foot patrols on campus; the office responds quickly to the needs of individuals on campus; and the office provides student-safety escorts as requested.

Providence College strongly encourages the prompt and accurate reporting of all criminal or suspicious activities occurring on or near campus. Reports can be made by calling or visiting the Office of Safety and Security, by speaking with an officer on patrol, or by communicating with a member of the residence life staff. Once a report is received, it will be evaluated and appropriate action will be taken. Reports to the Office of Safety and Security may form the basis of criminal charges (violations of state and federal laws) and/or disciplinary matters (violations of College policy). Crimes involving violence, major property loss, sexual assault, racial violence, or felony charges are reported immediately by the Office of Safety and Security to the Providence Police Department or the Rhode Island State Police.

Persons who prefer not to report alone may be supported by the presence of a friend. Students may report a crime by contacting a member of the community who serves as a resource for students, such as a counselor, chaplain, coach, dean, hall director, work-supervisor, or faculty member.

Crime victims may also file criminal reports directly with the Providence Police Department at its office complex in Providence, R.I., or by calling (401) 272-3121. Complaints made to the Providence Police Department are investigated by the department and referred to the state attorney general's office for prosecutorial decisions.

Reports of and/or information about crimes that occur on campus—including but not limited to assaults, vandalism and thefts—may also be reported to the Silent Witness program via the Web page of the Office of Safety and Security. Reporters may identify themselves or remain anonymous. (Go to: www.providence.edu, click on “Student Life,” click on “Services for Students,” click on “Safety and Security.”)

THE OFFICE OF SAFETY AND SECURITY – STAFFING AND TRAINING

The employment procedures for persons employed in the Office of Safety and Security comply with federal and state regulations pertaining to criminal history records information. New applicants for the position of security officer must successfully complete a Rhode Island-approved psychological test and are subject to a nationwide record check. All members of the Office of Safety and Security have received extensive training in emergency medical procedures, first aid, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In addition, a program of in-service training is ongoing for all department members. Security officers do not carry firearms and do not have arrest powers.

POLICY FOR REPORTING THE ANNUAL DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS

The Office of Safety and Security compiles crime statistics, which are included in this report, in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crimes Statistics Act (also referred to as the “Jeanne Clery Act”; formerly known as the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990). In addition, the Office of Safety and Security maintains a daily crime log listing the nature, date, time and general location of each crime and the disposition of the complaint, if known.

Pursuant to the Jeanne Clery Act, the U.S. Department of Education requires all school officials with “significant responsibility for student and campus activities” to report incidents of alleged campus crime to the College’s Office of Safety and Security. Campus school officials include the following categories of employees: security; residence life; student conduct; deans; student affairs, athletics administrators and team coaches; and faculty moderators and advisors.

The College is not required to include crimes reported only to a pastoral or professional counselor in the crime statistics published in this report. A student who seeks personal counseling on campus is advised that if he/she shares information regarding the commission of an offense that the counselor considers to pose a direct threat to the student or others, information may be released to appropriate authorities. Appropriate authorities may include College administrators, a parent/guardian, medical personnel, and police officials. Whether or not, and to whom, to release information will depend on particular circumstances.

The College compiles its crime statistics using the uniform crime reporting system of the Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation, including any modifications pursuant to the Hate Crime Statistics Act. Please note that crime statistics are based on incidents reported. A criminal incident is reported when it is brought to the attention of the Office of Safety and Security or the local police by a victim, witness, or other third party. Crime statistics, for Jeanne Clery Act purposes, include all reports regardless of their investigative status or result.

CRIME ALERTS – TIMELY WARNING POLICY

In the event that campus security or local law enforcement authority receives a report of a crime (in accordance with the F.B.I. definitions of crime categories), and the commission of the crime (whether on or off-campus) constitutes an ongoing threat to the campus community, a campus-wide, timely warning in the form of a “crime alert” will be issued in an email message to students, faculty, and staff. The purposes of the timely warning are to alert the campus community to the occurrence of a crime that poses an ongoing threat and to heighten student and employee safety awareness in a manner that will aid in the

prevention of similar crimes. The email will identify that a crime alert has been issued, provide pertinent information regarding the incident and may provide a link to other safety awareness tips.

In accordance with the Jeanne Clery Act, determinations about whether and when to issue warnings will be made by the Office of Safety and Security on a case by case basis in light of all the facts surrounding a crime, including factors such as the nature of the crime, the continuing danger to the campus community, the availability of accurate information, and the possible risk of compromising law enforcement efforts. Depending on the particular circumstances of the crime, the Office of Safety and Security may provide expanded notice in accordance with the College's emergency notification policies and procedures. Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to the Office of Safety and Security.

EMERGENCY TELEPHONES AND THE COLLEGE'S EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND EVACUATION PROCEDURES

More than 40 emergency "Blue Light" telephones are located throughout campus; all calls to the emergency phone number – **2222** – are received in the Office of Safety and Security, which has the ability to monitor activity in the area through remote cameras. Some of these telephones are mounted on the entrances to dorms and buildings, and others are strategically located around the campus. Emergencies may also be reported by pressing the red emergency button on any Blue Light phone.

In the event of an emergency, Providence College will utilize multiple means of communicating with members of its community. The Connect ED system is designed to produce mass notification of a campus emergency through campus telephone, cellular phone, text messaging, and email communications. The system allows messages to be delivered that will direct the campus community regarding safety measures during a critical incident on the campus or in the surrounding community.

More than half of the emergency "Blue Light" telephones include a "Red Light" signal and audible-message capability that can be activated by the College in the event of a campus-wide emergency to deliver instructions about what immediate actions individuals should take. The College also may utilize campus radio and television communications systems to issue emergency messages. Campus security vehicles have been retrofitted with public address systems to enable broadcast of emergency alerts and/or instructions. When information or instructions are broadcast through any of the above communication channels, all members of the campus community should immediately follow the specific instructions provided in that broadcast.

An Emergency Procedures Quick Reference Guide is located in campus classrooms, in academic and administrative departments, and in residence halls, along with emergency exit route maps and the designated rally point for that building. Under the direction of the College's director of emergency management, a series of emergency response drills for faculty, staff, and students are scheduled on an annual basis. Fire safety procedures are addressed regularly with all students who live in campus residence halls and a series of fire drills is scheduled annually.

CAMPUS SEX CRIMES PREVENTION ACT (CSCPA)

The federal CSCPA (amending the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, also known as “Megan’s Law”), requires institutions of higher education to advise the campus community how they may obtain State law enforcement agency information concerning registered sex offenders. It also mandates that, upon enrollment or employment at any college in Rhode Island, those persons who are mandated to register as sex offenders provide notice to the State of such enrollment or employment status.

In Rhode Island, categories of convicted sex offenders are registered with the local police department in their respective municipalities. In Providence, sex offenders must register with the Providence Police Department. Persons seeking information related to the sex offenders registry and access to related information should contact the Providence Police Department at 272-3121, or the Sex Offenders Community Notification Unit with the Rhode Island Parole Board at 462-0905, or online at www.paroleboard.ri.gov.

ACCESS TO BUILDINGS

Except for the residential halls, the Office of Safety and Security unlocks the administrative and academic campus buildings in the morning and secures them in the evening. The majority of buildings are open to the public during normal business hours. When any College facility is used at night or beyond normal operating hours, the Office of Safety and Security must be notified of that use so that it may monitor the facility.

Some facilities have individual hours which may vary at different times of the year, for example, the Concannon Fitness Center and the Phillips Memorial Library. These facilities will be secured according to the schedules developed by the department responsible for the facility. Emergencies may necessitate changes to any posted schedules.

Students have controlled access to the residence halls through an electronic card-access system that utilizes the student's College identification card. Students only have card access to the building to which they are assigned to live and to shared, common-area lounge space in designated buildings. Students should review the Student Handbook and regulations promulgated by Residence Life for Guest Program policies and procedures.

CRIME PREVENTION, PERSONAL SAFETY AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Student-Safety Escort Service – 865-2391: The Office of Safety and Security offers a student-safety escort service to members of the community who wish to be accompanied when traveling to and from residence halls and academic facilities. Student-safety escorts are available Monday through Thursday from 6:30 p.m. to 1:00 a.m., and Sunday from 7:00 p.m. until midnight, from the Phillips Memorial Library, Harkins Hall, Domenic Chapel, and the residence halls. In addition, the service is available campus-wide through the Office of Safety and Security at extension 2391.

Off-Campus Transportation: To travel downtown and throughout the state of Rhode Island, students may utilize Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA) service, free of charge. Students must present a valid Providence College ID when boarding the bus. This service is available seven days a week, 12 months of the

year. Bus #55 has stops on Huxley Avenue, making downtown's Kennedy Plaza, the Amtrak Station, and North Providence's Shaw's Plaza easily accessible to students. From Kennedy Plaza, students can transfer to lines serving the entire state, including T. F. Green Airport. Off- Campus Shuttle Services:

Between Campus and the Neighborhood

To help ensure the safety of those residing off campus, the Office of Student Activities-Involvement-Leadership (S.A.I.L)/Slavin Center runs a shuttle service between the campus and the surrounding PC neighborhood. The Off-Campus Shuttle operates seven nights a week when classes are in session. To use the service, you must present a valid PC ID card to the shuttle driver.

Community Service Shuttle—Runs Monday through Friday

This shuttle will take students to local community-service sites not easily accessible by RIPTA or to a common drop off/pick up point between several sites. The Campus Ministry office develops a new schedule/route at the beginning of each semester.

Automated transportation information is available 24 hours a day/seven days a week by calling 865-2940.

Students are encouraged to read the manual, titled Living Off-Campus, for tips about safety and security. Copies are distributed to all off-campus students and are available at the Office of Off-Campus Living, Off-Campus Living and O.C.R.O. (Off-Campus Residence Organization, a board within Student Congress) participate in programs offering advice on personal safety and property protection.

The Office of Safety and Security distributes crime prevention material to students, faculty, and staff and participates in many programs and demonstrations to inform and educate the College community regarding security measures. Crime prevention is a major and ongoing priority. Toward that end, the Office hosts local law enforcement and fire services departments to present information regarding crime awareness and safety issues at an annual fair in conjunction with national Crime Prevention Month. The Office also provides training classes for students and staff on issues such as Rape Aggressive Defense (RAD), and it participates in meetings and on committees regarding crime and safety issues. Further, the Office maintains a security-officers liaison program with all residence halls in order to foster regular communication with residence life staff and to assure that it is alerted to problems that might arise within residence life. Safety in the Residence Halls: The Student Handbook, which is available via the Student Life page of the Providence College website (www.providence.edu/Student+Life/Student+Handbook.htm), includes policies and regulations governing on-campus living. Each residence hall is staffed with a hall director and several resident assistants who regularly monitor compliance with safety and security requirements. These staff members also rely on the cooperation of residential students to enforce regulations and report violations that may compromise the safety and security of residents. The Office of Safety and Security and residence hall directors must be notified immediately if students or other members of the community discover that any safety and security system, including doors and locks, appear to have been tampered with and/or are

not in proper working order. In addition, students are prohibited from using objects to prop-open doors and doors to living spaces should not be left ajar or unlocked.

Education and Prevention Programs

The College's Personal Counseling Center offers individual and group counseling, crisis intervention and substance abuse assistance. It also participates in educational workshops and outreach activities. The educational workshops cover a variety of topics, including personal safety, sexual assault, and acquaintance rape. In addition, staff in the Personal Counseling center work together with others on campus (for example, security officers, residence life staff, members of SART, and health center professionals) and community-based service providers, in the service of students. Personal Counseling services are free of charge for students and are confidential within the limits of the law and ethical guidelines. The director and other members of the counseling staff are involved in reaching out and training new tiers of student affairs personnel in the area of sexual assault. This in-service training has given a foundation of understanding to staff who may possibly be first-hand responders in a sexual assault emergency, including security supervisors, EMTs, hall directors, and student health center staff.

The Personal Counseling Center staff educates students about what services are available in the counseling center, Student Health Center, chaplain's office, and residence life office. For many years the Personal Counseling Center has worked closely with various local community and mental health services. In particular, this has resulted in a strong, supportive relationship with Day One - The Sexual Assault and Trauma Resource Center and the Providence Center, which both offer outpatient treatment for victims of sexual assault.

The Providence College Personal Counseling Center offers a wide range of programs and workshops designed to educate the PC community on many aspects of sexual assault, acquaintance rape, relationship violence, and personal safety. During freshman orientation, the center also participates in a mandatory workshop on effective decision making. The workshop deals with decisions regarding alcohol, interpersonal conflict, and sexual assault, and is co-facilitated by personal counselors and orientation staff.

The Personal Counseling Center writes articles for publication in The Cowl, the PC student newspaper. Efforts to involve external resources have included a workshop on the legal system and victims of sexual assault, run in conjunction with the Providence Police and Day One - The Sexual Assault and Trauma Resource Center. In addition, the Office of Residence Life and the Office of Off-Campus Living run workshops on topics such as sexual assault, acquaintance rape, self defense, driving safety, and fire safety.

Simply Healthy, a peer education club, strives to promote a wellness environment in the academic and social lives of Providence College students. Through various presentations, such as Assertiveness and Self Esteem, Eating Disorders, and Stress Control, peer educators encourage other students to talk openly about responsible habits and attitudes concerning alcohol and other related issues. Students interested in taking part in these programs or becoming a peer educator, are encouraged to contact the office at 401-865-1817.

Sexual Assault – Policy Statement Regarding Programs and Procedures

Sexual misconduct in all forms, including sexual assault, violates the sanctity of the human body, mind, and spirit and will not be tolerated with the College community. Sexual misconduct is one of the most serious violations of the College's standards of conduct for its students and some forms of sexual misconduct constitute violations of civil and criminal law. The College's Sexual Misconduct Policy includes information about prohibited behavior, reporting procedures, and resources and services. The College's Sexual Assault Response Team (S.A.R.T.) meets with students who are victims of sexual assault and serves as a point of contact, information, and support, especially in terms of directing the victim to professional resources of aid, care, and recourse both on and off-campus. S.A.R.T. members are volunteer faculty, staff, and administrators who have been properly trained by Day One - The Sexual Assault Trauma Resource Center. A student who is a victim of sexual assault is encouraged to notify proper law enforcement authorities, including the College's Office of Safety and Security and local police. In addition, when a victim of sexual assault and/or other forms of sexual misconduct identifies a student as the alleged offender, the allegation of sexual misconduct is resolved in accordance with the disciplinary procedures outlined in the Student Handbook.

Sexual Assault – Recommended Action for Victims

If you believe you are the victim of a sexual assault, you should take the following steps: first, go to a safe place; and second, tell someone. You may report the assault to Security (865-2222), a member of the residence life staff, law enforcement authorities, and/or any of the resources listed below. If you choose not to report the assault but to seek personal counseling, you may contact the Personal Counseling Center directly or, without disclosing any details of the incident, ask a member of the residence life or security staff to contact the on-call counselor on your behalf. Providence College strongly urges students to report sexual assault to campus security and local police so that the College can take appropriate action to provide help to the victim and attempt to prevent future assaults. If a victim chooses to pursue criminal prosecution through the courts, campus personnel are able to assist in the process of notifying the police.

Third, you are advised to seek medical attention immediately. Both female and male students can be victims of sexual assault. The College encourages female victims to go to Women & Infants Hospital because it has specially-trained staff to assist them. Male victims are encouraged to go to Rhode Island Hospital or the nearest hospital. Medical attention is critical so that any injuries (including internal injuries) or infections that may have resulted from the assault can be treated. Getting a medical exam does not mean that you have to press criminal charges; however, a medical exam will help to preserve evidence if you choose to press charges at some point.

Fourth, preserve and record evidence, including the following: do not wash anything (body, hair, clothes), and do not comb your hair, change your clothes, douche or use the toilet; bring an extra set of clothing to the hospital; record a description of the assailant; and, record where the assault occurred, and a description and direction of travel of any vehicle involved.

Please be aware that victims of assault may seek assistance in changing, either on a temporary or permanent basis, existing academic and living situations. The College will make every effort to honor requests if such changes are reasonably available. Victims may also seek additional help, confidential counseling and assistance. Victims should not isolate or blame themselves, or feel guilty. Sexual assault, whether perpetrated by a stranger or someone known to the victim, is a serious violation of a person's inherent dignity and humanity.

Sexual assault by a member of the College community is a violation of the College's policies. Any student who, pursuant to the College's disciplinary procedures, is found to have violated the sexual misconduct policy will receive appropriate sanctions. To ensure fairness and respect for the accuser and the accused during the process, the Student Handbook outlines procedures that will be followed. In any disciplinary proceeding alleging a sex offense, both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the final determination and any sanction imposed against the accused. The federal privacy law, FERPA, permits disclosure of this information; therefore, FERPA does not conflict with this provision of the Jeanne Clery Act.

CRIMINAL OFFENSES – JURISDICTION AND ADJUDICATION

Although the Providence College Office of Safety and Security does not possess the power to arrest, the office does assist police departments in their investigations. When the Providence Police are called to take a criminal report by the Providence College Office of Safety and Security, the police department has jurisdiction in the matter. If the Providence Police make an arrest and the suspect is a student or employee, he/she may not only be charged for the offense in the court system, but also via the applicable College disciplinary system.

OFFICE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

Providence College views student discipline as an integral part of its educational process, assisting students in their growth and development and helping them to understand the harmful impact of their inappropriate behavior. The student discipline process also protects the College community from persons who might detract from the mission and goals of the College. Through the disciplinary system, the College reserves the right to dismiss, suspend, or otherwise penalize a student for serious violations of published regulations, policies, and proscriptions.

ALCOHOL POLICY

Those who use alcoholic beverages or sponsor events serving alcohol are obliged to comply with state law and College policies and regulations. Under Rhode Island law, alcoholic beverages may be legally delivered, sold or served to persons 21 years of age or older only. In addition, the law forbids the misrepresentation of one's age in order to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages. Students who consume alcohol are responsible for their behavior and may face sanctions if they violate College policy. In compliance with federal law, Providence College has adopted and implemented a program to prevent the illicit use of drugs and abuse of alcohol by its students and employees. Students receive written

information regarding implementation of the program in accordance with regulation implemented by the U.S. Department of Education.

Any employee of Providence College, permanent or temporary, full-time or part-time, is prohibited from engaging in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance on the College campus. Any such activity constitutes grounds for termination. Commonly abused drug and substances include, but are not limited to, alcohol, painkillers, sedatives, stimulants, tranquilizers, as well as marijuana, cocaine, heroine, and other illegal drugs. An employee's use of drugs or alcohol that impairs judgment, performance, or behavior, whether on campus or on College business off-campus, will be subject to discipline, including suspension or termination.

DRUG POLICY

The possession, use, distribution, and/or sale of any illegal drug, and the misuse of prescription drugs, are violations of federal and state law and College policy. The College cooperates with federal, state, and local law enforcement investigations and efforts aimed at controlling the possession, use, distribution, and sale of illegal drugs, including the non-medical use, sale, or distribution of prescription drugs. By law, use of prescription drugs is limited to those for whom the prescription has been issued. It is also illegal to sell, provide, or distribute prescription drugs to others without proper authorization.

Students are prohibited from being present in a room or space where illegal drugs are being used, whether or not they are using or observed using the illegal drugs.

Any student using, dealing, selling, or distributing illegal drugs on campus or off campus may be dismissed from the College pursuant to the College's disciplinary procedures. The possession, use, or distribution of drug paraphernalia (e.g., pipes, glassware, and other items) is strictly forbidden. For purposes of any disciplinary hearing, the College will conclude that a student is dealing in drugs if the student is found to have possessed a large quantity of illegal drugs. For example, more than two ounces of marijuana and more than four grams of cocaine would constitute a large quantity of these illegal drugs. Judgments with respect to quantity will be made concerning any other illegal drugs. The College may be obligated to notify law enforcement authorities for drug violations on campus.

The College complies with the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act (1989 amendments).

WEAPONS POLICY

The College forbids the unauthorized use, distribution, manufacture, or possession of a dangerous weapon or material of any type or description, including but not limited to firearms, explosive devices, dangerous chemicals, compressed-air guns, slingshots, pellet guns, BB guns, knives, metal-dipped darts, laser pointers, incendiary devices, fireworks, ammunition, bow or crossbow designed to shoot arrows, or any other item deemed to be dangerous by College officials.
